Capital Health facility to open Nov. 6

HOPEWELL TOWNSHIP -Capital Health Medical Center --Hopewell will open on Nov. 6, according to Capital Health's board of directors.

The new Hopewell Townshipbased medical facility will be located off Scotch Road, north of Interstate 95's Scotch Road exit. Because of its location, it will be readily accessible to residents of Mercer and nearby Bucks and Hunterdon counties.

Nov. 6 also will mark the transition of Capital Health - Mercer from an acute care hospital to a Satellite Emergency Department, according to Donald MacNeill, Capital Health spokesman.

On that date, patients from Capital Health - Mercer, located on Bellevue Avenue in Trenton, will be transferred by ambulances to Capital Health Medical Center - Hopewell.
